


PILOT DIAGRAM



(The TURNING POINT...The main event between the protagonist and the antagonist or the moment for which the reader has been waiting.)

John Thornton saves Buck from Hal's beating.

CLIMAX

(All responses, except in the "Characters and Setting" chart, must be written in detailed and COMPLETE SENTENCES.)

RISING ACTION

(The major events, in chronological order, that lead to the turning point.)

FALLING ACTION

(The major events, in chronological order, that lead to the resolution.)

Fall, Winter, Spring


All Major Places (minimum of 4)

CONFLICT*

(What's the problem between the protagonist and the antagonist?)

Buck struggles between civilization and the wild.



RESOLUTION

(How was the conflict solved?)

Buck becomes the leader of wolves, and a legend figure. He continues to father countless cubs. Every year he returns to his mountain before returning to town.

How To Figure Out the Theme

1. Actively read the text. Underline, highlight, circle before reading.
2. Fill out the Plot Diagram Return to Town.
3. Examine the conflict, Resolution and turning points.
4. Ask yourself, "What is the lesson the protagonist learned?" or "What lesson or message does the author want me to understand?"
5. Reword #4 so that it can apply to anyone in life. It should NOT mention any details about the novel.
